- there are too many surplus places in the primary sector
- progress in reducing surplus places has been slow, but a clear strategy is now being implemented which is likely to involve some school closures

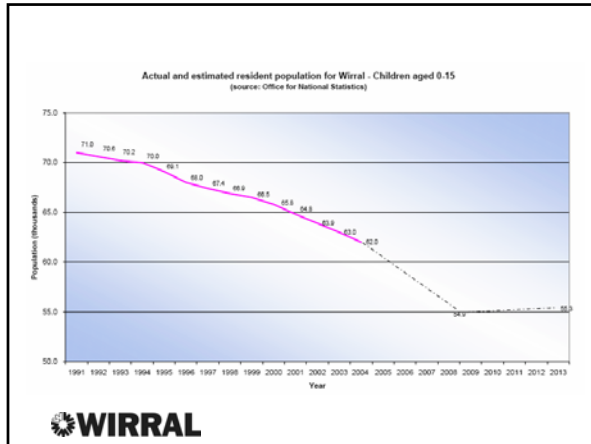

Children per woman

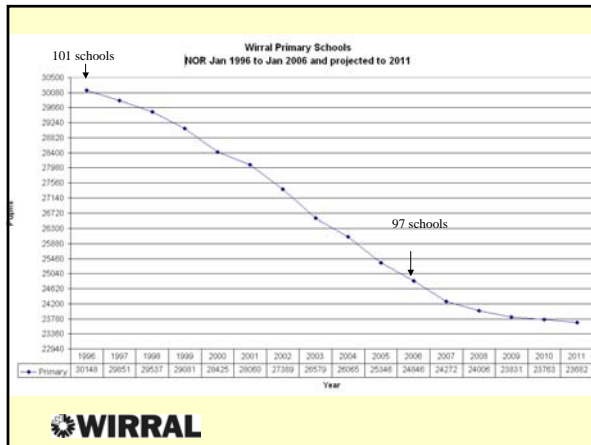
The average family should settle at 1.7 children

Surplus places in Wirral

In 2006
12% empty places

Spending £4.2 million pounds or £165 per primary pupil on empty spaces

By 2011
16% surplus places

1 in 4 schools will have more than 25% surplus places

WIRRAL

Surplus places – why do we need to act?

- Audit Commission says **surplus space** in schools should be **between 5% and 10%**
- Above 10%, wasting money supporting empty classrooms
- 4%-5% allows degree of parental choice
- No school should have more than 25% surplus – annual return to Government

WIRRAL

Creative removal of surplus

LA and Schools have created:

- ICT suites
- Libraries
- Parents rooms
- Pre-school playgroups
- Afterschool/Breakfast clubs
- Adult Learning facilities
- Bases for other services

And removed:

- Temporary mobiles

WIRRAL

Many complicated factors

- Surplus places
- Small schools
- Standards
- Location
- Where parents choose to send their children
- Value for money
- Catchment zones
- Housing changes
- Traffic and transport
- Denominational issues



How small is small?

- School Organisation Plan (2003) says under 210
- Wirral Policy (2005) says under 180
- DfES (2005) says under 150



Small Schools

- Financial – maintaining small school is at the expense of all children
- Organisational issues – mixed age classes
- Additional burden on staff
- Curriculum issues



What has happened so far

120 classroom equivalents removed without closing any schools

Phase 1 - Birkenhead and Beechwood

- Amalgamation of Prenton Infant and Junior
- Amalgamation of St Oswald's CE and Vyner Primary
- Closure of The Dell Primary

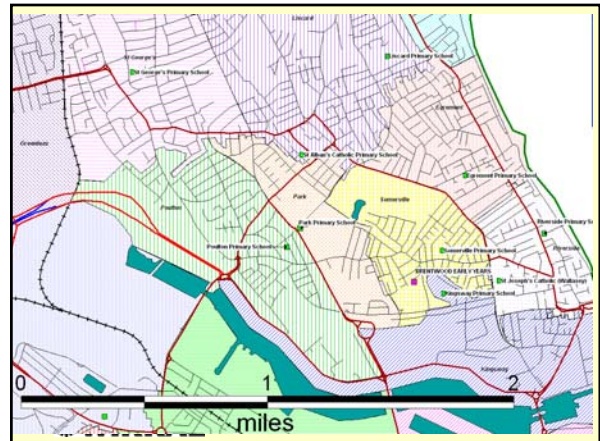
Phase 2 - Bromborough, Eastham, Bebington, Spital and Thornton Hough

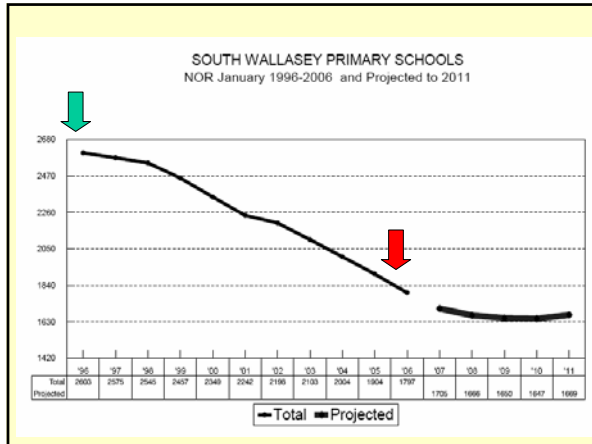
- Closure of Bromborough Pool Primary (Summer 2007)
- Also, mobile removal, pre-school re-location
- Proposed closure of St Mary's CE (Eastham)

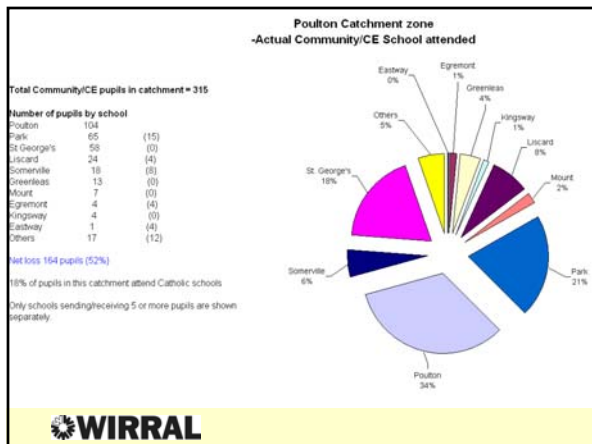
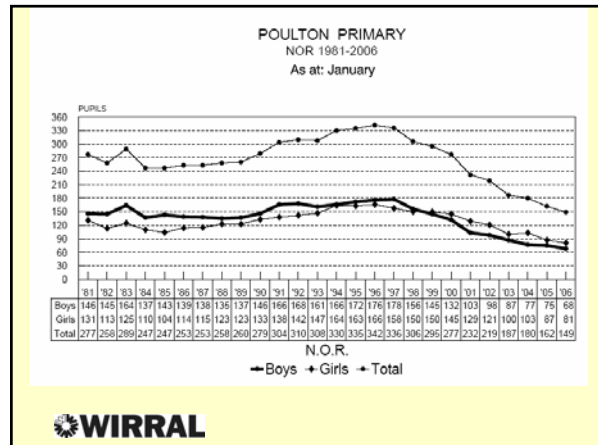
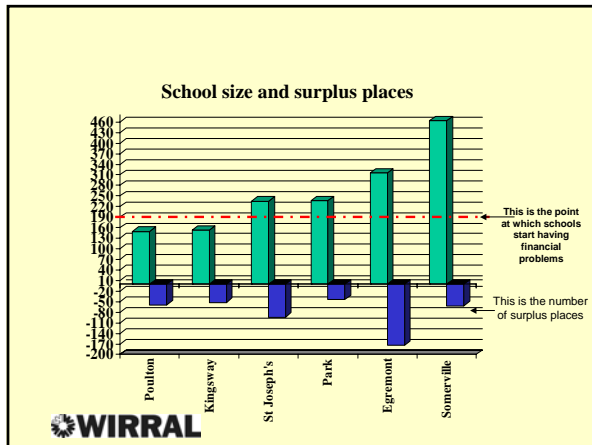


Surplus places in South Wallasey Area

23% surplus places

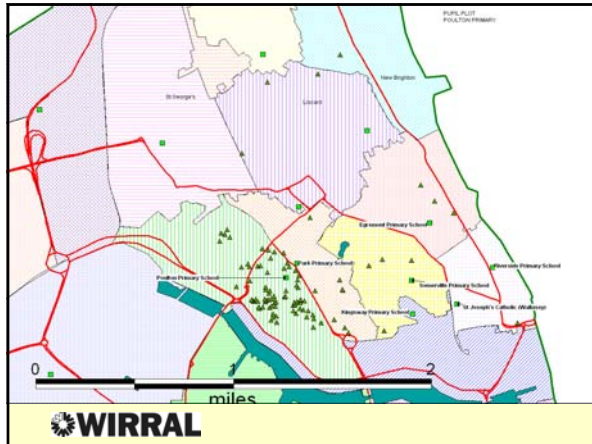
By 2011

We must act to reduce surplus places



What Ofsted said (2002)

- Pupils achieve well; their work is often better than that found in similar schools, especially in music.
- Very good provisions for pupils' personal and social development lead them to show good attitudes and behaviour and to make very good relationships.
- The teaching is of good quality; lessons and other activities provide a good range of opportunities for pupils to learn and to widen their interests.
- The school takes very good care of pupils' welfare and provides strong support and guidance, including very good provision for pupils with special educational needs.
- Parents think well of the school and the school strives to involve them as partners in their children's education.
- The leadership and management provided by the headteacher and senior staff are very good.
- Checks on teaching and learning could be carried out more widely and rigorously, extending the good practices already established in English and mathematics.
- Assessments of pupils' progress could also be more precise in subjects other than English and mathematics.
- Planning across the curriculum could provide better opportunities for pupils to apply and develop their skills in literacy, numeracy, ICT and investigation.



Possible options for South Wallasey

- A: Closure of Poulton Primary School
- B: Amalgamation of Park Primary and Poulton Primary at either site
- C: Closure of Brentwood Early Years AND open F1(nursery)classes at local schools



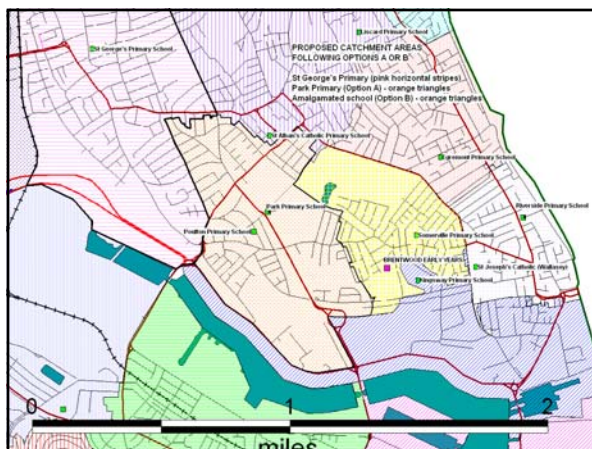
A – Closure of Poulton Primary

- Small school
- 66% of children in the catchment already attend other schools, mainly Park and St George's
- Park and Poulton 300 metres apart
- 27 other primary schools within 2 miles
- Building improvements would be made to receiving schools
- Catchments rezoned



B – Amalgamation of Park and Poulton at either site

- Combined school at either site
- Pupil populations overlap
- Two sites 300 metres apart
- Building improvements would be made
- Catchments rezoned



C – Closure of Brentwood EYC and create F1 classes at local schools

- Children's Centre based at Seacombe Family Centre
- Majority go on to attend Somerville
- Create F1 classes at Park and Somerville
- "Half" nursery at Kingsway and Poulton could be expanded
- Extended schools provision
